October 15, 2001

The regular meeting of the Town Board of the Town of Clifton Park was held in the Town Office Building at 7:00 p.m., Supervisor Barrett presiding.

ANNOUNCEMENTS AND COMMUNICATIONS

Supervisor Barrett said Matzen Construction, the general contractor for the privately built arena, is in financial difficulty but there is a crew still working at the new arena. He stated this doesn't have any effect on the town as the new arena is a privately financed and built structure. He said Mr. Bobrow is paying the crew and subcontractors directly. The Supervisor announced the town arena opened a month ago and is a greatly improved facility and expressed appreciation to Mr. Bobrow for his efforts.

Councilman Roth announced the dedication of the new Welcome to Clifton Park sign at Exit 8 has been postponed. He further announced all volunteers for the Special Collection Day will be recognized at the November 5th Town Board meeting.

Councilman Paolucci said he has submitted research regarding a noise ordinance to the Town Board for review. He said the packet contains laws of other municipalities, as well as case law. He gave an update on adult entertainment, noting areas are being looked at in terms of minimizing any adverse impacts. At the present time there are over 900 acres available where a business could locate and it is hoped to limit it to approximately seventy acres. Every commercial area in town has been looked at, including the Wood Road corridor, Pierce Road corridor and an area off of Route 9 south of Ushers Road. The Route 9 area appears to be the best as the Northway is a significant buffer and it is a light industrial zone. Councilman Paolucci reported when the Department of State gave their presentation in July they gave another objective form of measurement in looking at the number and how close houses are to the area and when this is taken into account the Pierce Road area is not as favorable as the Route 9 area. Councilman Paolucci said other areas are also being looked at for a viable solution. He anticipates this should be completed within a few weeks.

Councilman Paolucci said he has been talking to the Water Authority regarding other ways of conserving water and has been looking at a top soil standard as another conservation measure. He said there is evidence that if compostable material is put down less water is used for irrigation. He said the Environmental Specialist O'Brien is conducting research and the town's Environmental Conservation Commission thinks this has merit. He said Director of Building and Zoning Clemens feels this a good step into making sure the town has a viable water source in the future.

Supervisor Barrett said adult entertainment has been a difficult situation and there are areas being stricken from consideration, in particular the Pierce Road area.

Councilman Roth asked if an area can be designated for adult businesses within proposed adult use acreage rather than use all the acreage; e.g. create a pie shape within the acreage. Councilman Paolucci said this might be possible but the town would have to describe these parcels and typically parcel lines are the easiest way to that. Boundary lines are the best way to describe areas under consideration.

REPORTS

Report for September from the Saratoga County Sheriff's Department was filed with the Town Clerk.

Supervisor Barrett said early public privilege is meant mainly for a large group of people or someone with a small child that doesn't want to stay for the entire meeting.

PUBLIC PRIVILEGE

Eric Hamilton, Trails Committee Chairman, speaking in support of the resolution appropriating funding for capital improvements, specifically trails, said there is an ambitious master plan for trails and in order to see that move ahead more than the \$40,000 in the draft budget is necessary.

Norman Goldman, London Square Drive, asked for clarification of when and who can speak at early public privilege.

Supervisor Barrett said he would try to offer early public privilege when there is a busy agenda.

**PUBLIC HEARING, 7:10 PM
TO CONSIDER THE FRANCHISE RENEWAL AGREEMENT WITH
TIME WARNER CABLE**

The Town Clerk read the Notice of Public Hearing as published in The Daily Gazette on October 5, 2001.

Councilwoman Walowit briefly reviewed the agreement noting it is for ten years. She explained the town is asking for a five percent fee rather than the three percent being asked for by other municipalities. She said the town is also asking for two modulators or reverse speed lines to allow the town taping opportunities and live broadcasting from the Wood Room, stating those programs will be available to residents on the government access cable stations at no cost to the town. Councilwoman Walowit said she thinks the equipment for the broadcasts and taping should be provided by the Town of Clifton Park and taken from revenue from franchise fees. She said reduced rate for seniors was not possible. The basic rate for customers in the Town of Clifton Park is \$6.55 and this provides Channels 2-20. She introduced George Smead, Time Warner/AOL, Carol McTygue, Public Safety Commission, and assistant town attorney Joel Peller.

The public hearing was opened for comments from the audience at 7:30 p.m.

Gene Petronis, Clifton Park, asked what is a franchise fee, why do residents have to pay it and why would the town want to increase it.

Carol McTygue, PSC, noted franchise fees up to five percent are allowed under the Federal Cable Act, and it is the municipalities' decision whether or not to obtain that revenue from the cable company.

Councilwoman Walowit explained the extra two percent of the franchise fee would be used for government access programming, allowing Planning and Zoning Boards telecasting as well as local groups; e.g. the YMCA and the Library. She said she has seen a great deal of enthusiasm for this additional programming. Comptroller Heggen reported the town is receiving 4.051 percent at the present time and \$240,000 in revenues was received in 2000.

Supervisor Barrett said the question has come up since September 11th as to an emergency in Clifton Park and having information available on the government access channel which would help residents. He explained the franchise fee goes into the town's general fund and emphasized there is no town property tax and the full general fund is supported by revenue generated by the town. The Supervisor said the budget is \$8.5 million, \$2 million of which is surplus monies that the town sends back to the taxpayers through reduction of highway and county taxes, thereby noting the budget is really only \$6.5 million. It was noted the increase in the franchise fee would be less than one percent.

Ms. McTygue said the cable company would be happy to purchase the equipment for public access, however, that cost is going to be directly passed on to the subscriber.

Debra Harrington, Acorn Avenue, said with regard to getting information out, what about people in the community that can't afford cable.

Supervisor Barrett said the town has a website and a newsletter is planned for next year and by using as many vehicles as possible in a cost-effective manner, hopefully most of the population will be reached.

Councilman Roth asked if reduced rates for seniors would ever be considered in the future.

George Smead, Time Warner Cable, said Time Warner Cable's commitment to senior citizens at the present time is through the Senior Center where they have installed free RoadRunner and show movies once a month for the visually disabled. He said he feels this benefits senior citizens more than a discount and is less controversial in the long run as the cable company still have not been able to figure out a way to reduce only seniors rates.

Supervisor Barrett said it is his understanding that reduced rates for seniors in other municipalities were negotiated before the cable companies were bought out and are grandfathered in for a certain length of time.

Norman Goldman, London Square Drive, expressed concern about the variety and frequency of problems encountered with the broadcasting of Town Board meetings.

Bob Gauvreau, Oakwood Blvd., asked why there is a ten-year agreement. Councilwoman Walowit responded the franchise agreement can be changed at anytime. Supervisor Barrett said this agreement is required by law.

Ms. McTygue stated without a franchise agreement a cable company cannot legally provide cable service to a municipality. She said the terms and conditions of this agreement are quite flexible. Ms. McTygue noted cable companies are in competition with satellite companies.

Everyone was given an opportunity to speak in favor of or against the proposed agreement and no one else wished to be heard. Supervisor Barrett declared the public hearing closed at 8:05 p.m.

PUBLIC HEARING, 7:20 PM
TO CONSIDER A LOCAL LAW IN CONNECTION WITH PROHIBITING
UNATTENDED OR IDLING LARGE MACHINERY AND EQUIPMENT

The Town Clerk read the Notice of Public Hearing as published in The Daily Gazette on October 5, 2001.

Supervisor Barrett stated complaints have been received from residents regarding trains idling unattended for long periods of time and sometimes days at a time, particularly in Jonesville. He said representatives of the railroad company have said they will work with the town and do the best they can to remedy the problem. A meeting was held with residents and the head of security for the railroad and it appears the town's efforts to work with the railroad have proven fruitless to this point.

The public hearing was opened for comments from the audience at 8:06 p.m.

David and Tamara Caruso, Tanner Road, spoke in favor of the proposed legislation, stating there have been many sleepless nights when the trains idle at a high decibel levels. He said there are health concerns with diesel odors and safety concerns with children in the area and trains left unattended. Mr. Caruso said he has called the railroad company with no resolution. He further stated a taxi service drops people off through private property to run the trains. He questioned how this law would be enforced.

Town Attorney Trainor said there are teeth in the legislation calling for a fine up to a \$5000 for corporations and for individuals potential imprisonment and/or a fine.

Supervisor Barrett stated the town wanted to work with the railroad and not put any undue burden on business, but the neighborhoods have to be protected.

Councilman Roth said it is understanding that the trains are coming from one location and being left for another crew to come in to take to a different location. He said he understands they are left running because it is a job to get them running again.

Supervisor Barrett said he was told that the railroads didn't want the engines left running and that it was carelessness on the part of the operator.

Mike Koen, Rotterdam, said he and his wife and a group of citizens in Rotterdam, formed HALT (Homeowners Against Loud Trains) which is now 600 strong and recommended the Town Board listen to residents as this is an environmental impact and comes down to severity of stress and sleep disorders, as well being as a quality of life issue. Mr. Koen submitted a website for information: Federal Rail Administration - www.fra.dot.gov/horns

Debra Harrington, Acorn Avenue, expressed concern with tractor trailers and large equipment being included in this legislation. She stated tractor trailers are homes for the drivers and are supposed to be kept running if it is twenty degrees or colder. She further stated tractor trailers don't idle as loud or cause vibrations like a train and noted they are two different issues. Ms. Harrington said there is no place in Clifton Park for tractor trailers to park.

Norman Goldman, London Square Drive, said it is his understanding fuel gets sticky and can't start if diesel trucks are turned off in cold weather.

Mr. Trainor said one thing to consider between trains and tractor trailers is access and an idling tractor trailer is a lot more accessible than a train on a rail pass.

Supervisor Barrett asked Mr. Shahen and Ms. McHugh to look for areas that can be mapped out for truckers.

Ed Dussault, Grooms Road, stated it is against NYS law to leave an unattended vehicle running.

Don Nicoll, Phil Fitzpatrick, Ross Pusatere, Tom Lucas, Tanner Road residents, spoke in support of the proposed legislation, agreed diesel engines need to keep running, but it is the proximity that is of concern. It was also stated the proposed fines mean nothing to a large company. Mr. Trainor said the fines are per violation. Complaints were made not only with the noise of idling trains but the odor. Disagreement was expressed if this legislation also affects lawn tractors, snow plow trucks, etc. Mr. Trainor reviewed definitions in the legislation.

Supervisor Barrett stated the town is willing to work with the companies.

Everyone was given an opportunity to speak in favor of or against the proposed local law and no one else wished to be heard. Supervisor Barrett declared the public hearing closed at 8:40 p.m.

**PUBLIC HEARING, 7:30 PM
TO CONSIDER A LOCAL LAW TO CONSIDER A NINETY-DAY MORATORIUM
ON TELECOMMUNICATION TOWERS**

The Town Clerk read the Notice of Public Hearing as published in The Daily Gazette on October 12, 2001.

Supervisor Barrett said the town is close to coming up with recommendations and changes to the current legislation but an additional ninety-day moratorium is necessary.

The public hearing was opened for comments from the audience at 8:42 p.m.

Everyone was given an opportunity to speak in favor of or against the proposed local law and no one wished to be heard. Supervisor Barrett declared the public hearing closed at 8:42 p.m.

PRESENTATION ON REVENUE SHARING

Councilman Roth reported based upon county sales tax revenues, approximately \$900,000 will be coming back to the town. Discussions have been held between members of the Town Board on being a little more aggressive than in the past on the use of these funds and is proposing to reduce and stabilize the highway tax rate.

Councilman Paolucci presented the proposed Revenue Sharing Plan 2002-2005, attached, stating this is a commitment that would benefit all residents of town and it is the taxpayers' money. He expressed appreciation to Councilman Roth and Messrs. Heggen and Smead for assistance in preparation of the Plan.

Supervisor Barrett said there is \$1 million in a "rainy day" fund, and with continuing to reduce debt will put taxpayers in a very good position for many years.

Town Administrator Shahan updated the Board on activities, reporting budget workshops were held and the public hearing on the proposed budget is will be scheduled for November 8, 2001 with adoption planned for November 19, 2001.

Town Comptroller Heggen reviewed the financial report for September. He said Joseph M. Mastrianni, Inc., provider handling the Section 8 Program, has had an independent auditor prepare a report of internal controls and has received a clean opinion. He noted sale of a BAN for Olde Nott Farm Sewer District and Route 9 Fire Road Water District and obtained a rate of 2.32 percent. The town's share of county surplus has been received, of this the Board has designated \$534,000 with another \$100,000 yet to be designated.

PUBLIC PRIVILEGE ON RESOLUTIONS

Question from floor as to the amount of wetlands on the MacElroy Road parcel and who negotiated the sale. Supervisor Barrett, stated he negotiated the sale, noting there are at least forty five acres of usable property which will be used for both land preservation as well as park and recreational facilities.

Councilman Roth explained this amount is from undesignated equity per financials of December 31, 2000 which showed \$3,208,721. He reviewed various allocations that have been done from this surplus, noting there is still a good amount left in undesignated fund equity. He said many of these items were requested and since the money is available now the projects should be considered rather than wait another two and a half months.

Supervisor Barrett stated even after spending for the above projects, there is still \$1.5 million in undesignated surplus, in addition to the \$1 million "rainy day" fund.

Councilwoman Walowit noted these items had been asked for in the budget process and this is the first time in her memory items have been taken from the budget and put in a separate resolution for a separate spending item and said she is not certain as to the advantage of doing this. Mr. Heggen explained since this is designated, if an item or project is not purchased this year it will roll over to next year and will show in a budget line. Councilwoman Walowit said she has asked citizens where and how they would like to see surplus monies spent and prior to September 11th the response was reduction in highway taxes, landfill fees, and other fees but since September 11th people would like to see the surplus used with more caution due to the economy. She said she has concerns if the money is being spent the way the citizens want it spent. Councilman Roth explained these were items requested in the 2002 budget which have been taken out of the budget and are being put in the undesignated funds so they can be done now rather than have to wait until 2002. Councilman Roth explained these funds are coming from undesignated fund equity which is part of the general fund. Supervisor Barrett stated these requests are citizens' concerns and this is in direct response to the taxpayers. Councilwoman Walowit stated she doesn't disagree that these projects need to be done and thinks they all would have been approved in the budget process but her concern is separating them from the budget.
