ANNOUNCEMENTS AND COMMUNICATION

Supervisor Barrett thanked all involved with the recent Household Hazardous Waste Day and Shredding Day. At the Shredding Day food items, for the Jonesville Food Pantry, were collected as donations for the service. Thank you to 3N Document Destruction for their donation of time, trucks and assistance by shredding on-site residents' sensitive documents.

Supervisor Barrett extended sympathy to Gail Winters and son for the passing away of husband and father, Ron Winters. He was very dedicated to the town and supported many town programs over the years. He will be missed.

Supervisor Barrett announced the proposed tentative budget for 2022 is available. He stated there is a 3% increase in spending over last year. The town will remain without a town tax. The Highway fund budget for 2022 spending increase is proposed at 6% over last year with an ultimate tax decrease of 1%. He stated the EMS tax will increase .9% in 2022. The budget does not break the tax cap or use surplus funds. The proposed 2022 budget proposes 3 new positions. 1 in each of the following departments. Building, Buildings & Grounds and Highway. Priorities in programs and initiatives are for bulk waste pick-up in the Spring of 2022, new fencing along the Clifton Common boundary, resurfacing of basketball courts on the Common, improvements to the Veterans' Monument island on the Common, a line item in the budget for the Clifton Park Youth Advisory Council, replace the pool liner at Country Knolls pool, new equipment, vehicles and infrastructure. He noted the construction in the Ballston Lake Sewer District, which most of the houses are in the Town of Ballston, although the infrastructure improvements are strictly the financial responsibility of the property owners receiving the benefit, the new district that was formed counts toward the amount of money the town is allowed to spend in 2022 before reaching our Tax Cap limit with no baseline from 2021. A few items that don't involve town funds, which

will not be included in the proposed budget, are installation of the new Sitterly Road bridge and \$12 million secured for improvements to the Clifton Country Road and Rt. 9 intersections with Rt. 146. He stated the budget process is in the beginning stages with meetings and department workshops, with a final budget presentation in November.

Supervisor Barrett announced a book published by the Saratoga County Historical Society, "Saratoga County Stories". The book is a collection of 58 articles written by local historians on various topics about Saratoga County. An event to meet the authors will be held Saturday, October 23 from 2-5 at the Brookside History Center and Sunday, November 7 from 2-4 at the Grooms Tavern in Clifton Park.

Supervisor Barrett recapped from the September 20<sup>th</sup> Town Board meeting discussion on the ARPA, American Rescue Plan Act. Discussions so far are centered around assisting non -profits in the community as well as stormwater and sewer infrastructure. Conversations will continue in the next few months.

Councilwoman Standaert would like to expand on the discussion held on the ARPA funds from the last meeting where the Supervisor was proposing to spend over \$1 million of those funds. Board members were concerned with spending that amount of money without any significant details or supporting documentation with no prior notice to the public in writing. She requested that in the upcoming Town Board meetings, that an item be added to the agenda for the purpose of further ARPA discussions. She would like to see the public involvement and perhaps have a more detailed proposal presented. Councilman Morelli and she have discussed the non-profit application and would like to meet and work on it and present to the Town Board and public for consideration.

Supervisor Barrett stated he sent the Town Board a proposed application for the non-profits during the summer and questions were answered at the last meeting by the narrative and stipulations included in the draft application, but he is always open for more input and ideas on how we can make the application stronger. Proposal was for \$200,000 for the non-profit program, \$350,000 for stormwater and \$450,000 for sewer. At the previous meeting discussion was held on the need to replace the Highway gas pumps with consideration also for allocating \$60,000 for engineering services. Total of \$1 million sixty-thousand dollars. Welcomed the discussion to help move the projects forward.

Councilwoman Standaert stated it was on the previous Town Board meeting agenda as a discussion, but no resolution was presented for the Town Board consideration. The Town Board was asked to make a decision without details. Details and total amount for the next discussion would be appreciated.

Councilwoman Walowit stated she was concerned about the working committee. She would like to see more ARPA discussion by the Town Board and residents in the community. She would like staffing needs reconsidered that was included in the 2022 budget. She stated Building Department is down 4 people, Highway is down 4, Security is down 4 and Parks & Recreation is down 1 person.

Supervisor Barrett stated he asked for volunteers from the Town Board to be on the "working committee" which can't have any more than 2 Town Board members involved, Councilman Morelli came forward and volunteered, department heads and people directly involved in the presenting of ideas for projects based on the guidelines provided by the US Treasury are included.

Councilwoman Flood questioned how many times the working group has met and does not recall an email in July and being asked to be a part of it.

Supervisor Barrett stated he asked for volunteers for the working group in an email.

Councilman Morelli stated the opportunity to help the non-profits get support who lost funds due to the pandemic is important.

Councilwoman Standaert stated all the projects discusses are very important and supports them.

### EAGLE SCOUT PRESENTATION

Town Clerk Brobston read Resolution No. 226 of 2021 recognizing Maximilian Szczesny for achieving the rank of Eagle Scout.

Eagle Scout Szczesny explained his Eagle Scout project of the construction, design, and coordination of volunteers of a rosary garden located at the St. Edward the Confessor Roman Catholic Church. Leadership skills was a highlight of what he learned through Scouting.

### SHENENDEHOWA ROBOTIC RENOVATORS-THE LLAMA SYSTEM PRESENTATION

Councilwoman Flood introduced the group and stated she had achieved the LLAMA challenge and received a patch.

Naomi Hoffman, club advisor & coach, explained the program is about 25-30 students, multiple teams are formed within that group. The project is in its second year and has grown dramatically. The students were introduced and explained the project.

Robotic Team members explained their team challenge was to help people stay fit. This group created an app and website Llamasystem.org. The site showcases facts and direction about parks, trails and preserves in the Shen school district. The challenge and directions were developed using the site. At a robotics competition the group won the coveted prize of the Innovation Award and were nominated as semi-finalist to present the project at the worlds championship level which was a first for the district. The group has received 32,438 visits to their site this year. There are currently 7 finishers. Currently there are 131 people on their leader board. Garnsey Park is the most popular location. Arbor Day celebration was the kick-off of the LLAMA system. They promote the system through social media. The group will be volunteering at the Bump in the Night event on October 16 at Veteran's Park. They plan to launch more challenges to encourage people to hike trails and to do the same in the winter months. As a service to the community the group will be helping clean up trails and parks.

Councilwoman Flood presented the group with a certificate of appreciation.

WHEREAS, Max has been an active member serving in leadership positions including Patrol Leader, Den Chief, Troop Guide, and Troop Order of the Arrow Representative, and most recently elected as the Senior Patrol Leader of his Troop, and

WHEREAS, Max is also an active brotherhood member of the Kittan Order of the Arrow, serving as Naxa Nimat Chapter Chief and was selected for the Vigil Honor, a recognition bestowed on only a handful of Arrow men each year for their service and dedication to the Order of the Arrow at Chapter and Lodge levels, and

WHEREAS, Max's Eagle Scout Project, including design, coordination of volunteers and building of a rosary garden for the benefit of the parishioners of St. Edward the Confessor Roman Catholic Church in Clifton Park, and was completed in August of 2020, and

Resolution No. 227 of 2021, a resolution appropriating \$1,500,000 for the construction of Phase I of the Town Center Park Plan.

Introduced by Councilwoman Standaert, who moved its adoption, seconded by Councilwoman Flood.

WHEREAS, by Resolution No. 243 of 2017, the Town Board authorized the acquisition of 34 +/- acres of land in the Town Center from the Shenendehowa Central School District for park purposes, and

WHEREAS, by Resolution No. 97 of 2018, the Town Board established a Planning Committee and Stakeholders Group to conduct a comprehensive public planning process to develop ideas and concepts consistent with the community's vision for the future park, and

WHEREAS, by Resolution No. 25 of 2021, the Town Board adopted a Town Center Park Master Plan based upon input and evaluation obtained through the Stakeholders Group planning committee process, and

WHEREAS, by Resolution No. 101 of 2021, the Town Board retained Environmental Design Partners to design Phase I of the development plan for the Town Center Park, including initial storm water and archeological study, park access, and first trail connections, and

WHEREAS, on September 20, 2021, EDP presented its plan to establish park access and the initial park development consistent with Phase I design as outlined in the Town Center Master Plan, and

WHEREAS, the Town Board wishes to proceed with Phase I development of the 34 +/- acres of the Town Center Park, on lands acquired from the Shenendehowa Central School District in 2017, consistent with the Master Plan as articulated by Environmental Design Partners; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that the Town Board hereby appropriates the sum of \$1,500,000 for parkland development of Phase 1 of the Town Center Park Master Plan, and be it further

RESOLVED, that the Comptroller is directed to establish a capital projects fund with a transfer of \$1,500,000 from Undesignated Fund Balance (A-00915) to Interfund Transfer (A-08150-00015) to offset the costs of Phase 1 of the park development; and be it further

RESOLVED, that the Comptroller is authorized to establish a Capital Projects Fund, (H60-Clifton Park Town Center Park), with the funds to be utilized from the amounts above.

Resolution No. 228 of 2021, a resolution scheduling a public hearing on a proposed local law to amend Chapter 152 of the Town Code, relative to the Vischer Ferry Nature Preserve and town parks and lands.

Introduced by Councilwoman Standaert, who moved its adoption and seconded by Councilwoman Walowit.

WHEREAS, in 1977, residents of the town formed the Vischer Ferry Association to advocate for the creation of the Vischer Ferry Historical and Nature Preserve, successfully petitioning the town to accept responsibility for the preserve, and

WHEREAS, on April 25, 1977, the town received the first use and occupancy permit for the purposes of “establishing a recreation and nature preserve and, under the sponsorship of the Town Board, successfully petitioning the New York State Canal Corporation to delegate the operation and maintenance of the proposed lands to the town, as described in the “Vischer Ferry Historical and Nature Preserve Report” prepared by the Vischer Ferry Association, and

WHEREAS, since 1977, the Town has completed numerous capital projects and upgrades to the preserve, with individual permits issued by the Canal Corporation as necessary, and

WHEREAS, a list of recent capital projects, volunteer activities and Eagle Scout enhancements to the preserve is attached hereto, as Exhibit A, and

WHEREAS, in addition, the town has acquired some 67 acres of lands in close proximity to the original preserve lands for future addition to the preserve, and

WHEREAS, the Town Board wishes to schedule a public hearing on a proposal to accept a new and consolidated use and occupancy permit from New York State Canal Corporation to supersede individual permits issued on a project basis, and to recognize town lands as acquired for park and preserve purposes as designated nature preserve lands, to adopt maps demonstrating the current boundaries of the preserve lands, and to establish regulations for all preserve lands under the town’s management; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that a public hearing is hereby scheduled for October 18, 2021, at 7:05 PM in the Wood Memorial Room, 1 Town Hall Plaza, Clifton Park, New York, to receive public comment regarding a proposal to amend Chapter 152 of the Town Code, to recognize an expansion of the Vischer Ferry Nature and Historic Preserve.

**EXHIBIT A****Recent Projects Undertaken or Completed at the  
Vischer Ferry Nature & Historic Preserve as of September 2021**

Under the Town of Clifton Park's management of the Vischer Ferry Nature & Historic Preserve, the following actions have taken place in recent years:

**Recreational Enhancements**

- In 2021, the town improved a kayak/canoe launch site, near a picnic area by the river. The picnic area is supported by volunteers from the Chamber of Commerce.
- In 2021, the Town installed a new map at the Whipple Bridge entrance to the Preserve, to help inform the public on the multiple access points into the preserve.
- In 2020, the Town of Clifton Park built a new 100-foot pedestrian bridge east of the Clute's Dry Dock historic site to re-create a crossing over the enlarged canal at the site of a former farmer's bridge. This project used National Scenic Byway funds and NYS Canal Corporation funding resources in addition to local match / Town resources.
- In 2020, an Eagle Scout Leo Coons led a restoration of the pedestrian crossing on the west side of Clute's Dry Dock that reconnects the historic site to the original towpath on the Erie Canal. This restored a pedestrian crossing that had been a previous Eagle Scout project from the 1990s.
- In 2020, an Eagle Scout Michael Roos restored the old Eagle Scout Trail, the "White Trail" that runs diagonally from the Erie Canal Community Connector Trail at the Historic Double Lock 19 vicinity, to the southeast diagonally, on a route also known as the Tall Spruce Trail.
- In 2020, two (2) new benches between the Whipple Bridge and Historic Lock 19 were constructed and installed by an Eagle Scout in 2020.
- In 2017-18, volunteers updated the trail network's trail markings in 2018-19 and conducted mapping of the trails with help from volunteer Chris Nafis.
- In 2017-2018, the Town of Clifton Park rehabilitated the towpath trail from the end of Ferry Drive bearing easterly to the Town of Halfmoon (and the trail restoration continues into Halfmoon). This project is several miles long and is known as the Erie Canal Community Connector Trail. This project was completed with federal funds and local (Town) funds as match.
- In 2016, Eagle Scout Tom Holtzman created a short spur trail to the river as an overlook location with a park bench and river view. This trail is located off the south side of the Erie Canal Community Connector Trail, east of the CPWA access road.
- Other scouts and volunteer groups have assisted with trails maintenance throughout the preserve.

**Historic Enhancements**

- Volunteers led the vegetative clearing and removal of trees from the canal walls and conducted general site restoration of the Double Lock 19 historic site aided by engineering students from the Shenendehowa Central School District and members of the business community through the Southern Saratoga Chamber of Commerce, including the construction of a small pedestrian bridge at this site.

**Ecological Enhancements**

- Vischer Ferry NHP was named by Audubon New York as an Important Bird Area <https://www.audubon.org/important-bird-areas/vischer-ferry-nature-and-historic-preserve?site=ny&nid=5341>
- The NYS Department of Environmental Conservation (NYS DEC) designated the Vischer Ferry Nature & Historic Preserve as a Bird Conservation Area in 2006. <http://cliftonparkopenspaces.org/locations/vischersferry/>

**Educational**

- The Mohawk Towpath Scenic Byway produced a Cell Phone Tour of the entire Byway include several stops and locations within the Vischer Ferry Nature & Historic Preserve.
- The Byway has also funded and installed historic / cultural interpretative signage at Clute’s Dry Dock entrance; at Whipple Bridge entrance; and at Ferry Drive entrances to the Preserve.
- The Audubon Society of the Capital Region marked a bird interpretation trail route (with QR code markers on small wooden posts) to provide educational information to visitors.
- Bluebird boxes were installed, and a brochure was developed by Amanda Macey and Ms. Carvey for Girl Scouts Silver Award in 2016.
- Family Hike Interpretative Signage was installed by an Eagle Scout Douglas Connell in 2015.
- The Town Historian regularly leads historic tours of the VFNHP on foot and by guided bike ride.
- Birding groups lead regular birding walks at the VFNHP.

Town Attorney McCarthy gave a brief overview of the proposed law.

WHEREAS, the Town Board regularly accepts the dedication of open space in conjunction with Planning Board approvals of subdivisions throughout the town, and

WHEREAS, the Town Board wishes to clarify and codify its prohibition of hunting, or the discharge of bows and firearms, on all town-owned lands for any reason; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that a public hearing is hereby scheduled for October 18, 2021, at 7:07 PM in the Wood Memorial Room, 1 Town Hall Plaza, Clifton Park, New York, to receive public comment regarding a proposal to amend Chapter 153 of the Town Code to recognize Garnsey Park, and the former Saratoga P.L.A.N. lands, and to codify the town policy of prohibiting hunting, target shooting, and the discharge of bows or firearms on all town-owned lands, and the Town Clerk is directed to publish appropriate notice of the same.

#### PUBLIC PRIVILEGE

Darlene McGraw, Northpointe, stated she uses the CDTA Flexbus and thanked the Town Board for working on acquiring it in Clifton Park. She would like to see it expand its route. She presented a picture of Exit 8 where a group called ComPier worked on cleaning up the bus stop and parking area. She offered her assistance to the town as a person with disabilities.

Mel Boxer, Clifton Gardens, had questioned if others in the community and non-profits have been asked to be on the working group. Will the funds be used for community members to pay for their expenses at that time of the pandemic?

Supervisor Barrett stated there was a newspaper article and has talked with community businesses and non-profits about the ARPA funds. He explained the working group was an internal group, Town Board and department heads, to work on ideas to present to the Town Board and public. He explained there are other programs for residents to help with their expenses during the pandemic time.

Councilman Morelli stated on July 6, the Supervisor did send an email on the ARPA funds to all the Town Board members soliciting thoughts and he did bring input from Town Board members to the working group and made sure they were represented at that meeting.
